# Supporting Nursing Moms at Work: Employer Solutions Evaluation (Service Quality Recognition)

LTG provided evaluation support to OWH to understand the challenges and opportunities encountered by employers and mothers in accommodating lactating women returning to work after giving birth. A national sample of employers in manufacturing, education, health care, and retail/restaurant industries was identified for in-depth interviews to gauge their response to the resource and to elicit their policies, practices, and experience in developing and providing accommodations. A multi-state sample of women working in these same industries was drawn for in-depth interviews to elicit their experience and perspectives on their lactation accommodation when returning to work. The products of the project were a final report and a national briefing for the OWH and its partners.

#### National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA)

### Organizational Ethnography of the Aeronautics Autonomy Testbed Capability Team for the NASA Convergent Aeronautics Solutions, Aeronautics Research Mission Directorate (ARMD) (Service Quality Recognition)

LTG was contracted by NASA to conduct an ethnographic assessment of a rapid teaming process focused on an autonomy innovation challenge. The experiment was designed to understand and answer a central research question: Can a NASA ARMD team rapidly learn and apply new approaches to creating innovative conceptual designs using the best researchers currently available? NASA headquarters and team briefings were conducted, a final report focused on supporting change for innovation, a panel presentation at in international aviation innovation conference, as well as collaborative journal and news articles.

# Preventing Intimate Partner Violence in Immigrant and Refugee Communities

Preventing Intimate Partner Violence in Immigrant and Refugee Communities (SWW) was a national program of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) in collaboration with LTG Associates, as the national program office, to identify promising practices to prevent intimate partner violence (IPV) among immigrant and refugee populations in the U.S. The initiative also focused on building the capacity of organizations working in communities to conduct and utilize evaluations to enhance their work and improve their effectiveness. LTG evaluated the interventions and identified key effectiveness elements in preventing IPV and strengthening relationships and families. The findings were featured in a nationally distributed policy brief; LTG also conducted national briefings across policy and program audiences to report the results.

# Preparing for Treatment Programme Evaluation Project (*Praxis Award*)

LTG designed and conducted monitoring and evaluation tools and systems and provided evaluation capacity development to a global network of over 140 community-based HIV/AIDS treatment projects. The final report and presentation were focused to policymakers, international donors, NGOs, and grantees. Uses included a WHO organization-wide briefing, the International AIDS Conference, and, by the WHO and the Collaborative Fund. The report was widely cited for its utility and sensitivity.

#### U.S. Agency for International Development

### Population Technical Assistance Project (POPTECH) and the Monitoring, Evaluation and Design Support Project (MEDS) (Service Quality Recognitions)

LTG provided short-term support and technical assistance in design, monitoring and evaluation of maternal, child health, child survival, nutrition, infectious disease, HIV/AIDS, family planning, and reproductive health programs, with the goal of improving availability, quality, and use of key interventions. With a budget of 30 million dollars, nearly 400 projects were conducted globally in more than 50 countries over five years. LTG's work was cited for quality, timeliness, responsiveness, and cost-control.
